


## STATEWIDE REPORTED TRAFFIC FATALITIES 01/01/2008 – 02/24/2008



### SIGNIFICANT HIGHWAY PATROL APPREHENSIONS

02/11/2008 – 02/24/2008

OFFICER	DESCRIPTION
BBost	Trooper Bost stopped a 1998 Chevrolet Suburban on SR 4 in Butler County for marked lane violations. Upon contact with the vehicle, a strong odor of alcohol and subsequent failure of numerous sobriety tests led to the 9 <sup>th</sup> lifetime OVI arrest of the driver.
PAppleman KKelley K9 Helga	Trooper Appleman stopped a 1999 Buick Regal on I70 in Guernsey County for no front license plate. Numerous criminal indicators led to a probable cause search that uncovered 7lbs of marijuana (estimated valued of \$15,045) packaged in large ziploc bags in a trash bag in the trunk of the vehicle.
MMcNeely	Approximately 20 minutes after receiving a dispatcher broadcast of a stolen 2004 Pontiac Grand Prix from Trotwood, Ohio, Trooper McNeely spotted the vehicle pass him on I75 in Butler County. A pursuit ensued, with the vehicle weaving between traffic at speeds in excess of 100mph. The suspect eventually lost control of the vehicle and crossed several lanes of traffic before striking a concrete barrier. A short foot pursuit ensued before the suspect was finally apprehended.



### 2005-2007

- Between 2005 and 2007, Ohio State Highway Patrol officers made 14,593 drug arrests.
- OSHP District 9 officers accounted for the largest number of drug arrests, recording 2,747 during the three-year period.
- At the county-level, Scioto had the most 2005-2007 drug arrests (669), followed by Lorain (547), Lawrence (489), Ashtabula (452), Ross (428), and Trumbull (415).
- More than one-third (38%) of 2005-2007 drug arrests were issued on Friday or Saturday. For all days of the week, midnight to 2:00 a.m. stood out as "peak" hours for drug arrests (4,323 or 30%).
- Nearly one in four drug arrests were for motorists age 19-22 years old (3,495 or 24%). Over 80 percent of the offenders were males.




## SIGNIFICANT HIGHWAY PATROL DRUG SEIZURES

RStewart ARomero K9 Hans		Trp. Stewart stopped a 2007 Pontiac Grand Prix for an unsafe lane change on I80 in Lucas County. Numerous criminal indicators led to a PC search by Trp. Romero and K9 Hans. A positive alert uncovered 1/2 kilogram of cocaine (est. value of \$75,000) concealed in a duffel bag in the trunk of the vehicle. An inventory of the vehicle uncovered 2 grams of marijuana, rolling papers, and 3 pirated DVD movies.
GWolfe JWerner DNorman K9 Saba		Trp. Wolfe stopped a 2008 Hyundai Sonata on I71 in Franklin County for following too close. Numerous criminal indicators led to a PC search by Trp. Norman and K9 Saba. A positive criminal alert uncovered 2 kilograms of cocaine (est. value of \$200,000) in the trunk of the vehicle. This case led to other search warrants and the arrest of additional suspects.
SSimms SSmart K9 Rita		Trp. Simms stopped a 1999 Lincoln Navigator on I71 in Warren County. The owner of the vehicle was not present and the occupants gave conflicting stories about their trip. Criminal indicators led to a PC search by Trp. Smart and K9 Rita. A positive alert revealed 1 kilogram of cocaine (est. value of \$100,000) under the center console.
DJesse		Trp. Jesse stopped a 2008 Chevrolet on I90 in Ashtabula County for failing to move over for a stopped public safety vehicle. The odor of raw marijuana was detected and a probable cause search uncovered 6 pounds of marijuana in the passengers compartment.

## 24/7 LEADERSHIP

The Division's definition of leadership is "***The process of influencing human behavior to achieve organizational goals that serves the public while developing individuals, teams and the organization for future service.***"

The leader's goal should be one of development for followers to assume the leader's role, whether formally or, more importantly, informally. The leader must always keep in mind that the development of followers is both a critical and a required part of leadership.

There are a number of ways that leaders can develop their followers. The easiest and most common way is by observation. If the organizational goal is important to the leader and displayed in their daily routines and being the focus of their decision making model, the follower will deem it important to themselves and strive to achieve it.

It is the responsibility of the Leader to influence individuals, teams and the organization to achieve the organizational goal. Once this influence is realized and achieved, then future goals will have the same importance to its followers as it does to its leaders.

Einstein's definition of insanity, "***to keep doing the same thing and expecting a different result***" is quite applicable to leadership development.

You need to ensure that you institute behaviors that promote the desired results from your followers regardless if you are leading down or leading up the chain of command.

Impactful leaders must ***close the gap*** between individual success and organizational success. In today's Ohio State Highway Patrol, the goal is everywhere you look, "***The reduction of serious traffic crashes and apprehension of the criminal element through high-visibility, aggressive traffic enforcement and increased public awareness.***" While individual goals are not a vice, they can be made into more of a virtue, by having a leader that closes the gap with knowledge and decisions that satisfy both the individual and the organization.

Decisions will always be most difficult to make when immediate action is not present. It takes a true leader to make decisions that while may be unpopular, they are the right things to do.



**Colonel Lynn Black**

Col. Black had a clear picture of what he wanted the OSHP to be. Newspaper accounts from 1933-34 describe a Col. Black as one who is consistent and clear about how to form the Division and how to lead these men. He believed in his core values and expected the same confidence in his men.


Upon considering the position as superintendent, Black told Governor George White, "I figured the job (of superintendent) wouldn't be permanent for a man like me. Just as soon as one of my men arrested someone who boasted about a political connection, it would be just like me to put the guy in jail, throw away the key and resign my position."

Gov. White replied, "The job is yours."

## OSHP Forensic File

The OSHP Forensic File is a monthly article generated by the OSHP Crime Lab. Its purpose is to provide insight into interesting submissions to the crime laboratory and to use as an educational resource for the field.

### SERIAL NUMBER RESTORATION



Many manufactured items are impressed with a serial number for identification such as the vehicle identification tag for a piece of construction equipment shown above. This equipment ID tag was altered by a person that had a good title but did not have the equipment which went to that title. It is for instances like this that Criminalists are being requested to restore such a number when it has been removed or obliterated by grinding, rifling, or punching.

Serial numbers are usually stamped on a metal body or frame, or on a plate, with hard steel dies. Restoration of serial numbers can be accomplished because the metal crystals in the stamped zone are placed under a permanent strain that extends a short distance beneath the original numbers. When a suitable etching agent is applied, the strained area will dissolve at a faster rate than compared to the unaltered metal, thus permitting the etched pattern to appear in the form of the original numbers.

The choice of etching reagent will depend on the type of metal surface being worked on. Acids generally work well for steel surfaces. At times, and as shown in the attached digital images, reagents are not suitable for the restoration of the numbers. Using a digital microscope, measurements are made of known digits of the serial numbers and compared with the alleged altered digit. Although the original serial number may not be able to be restored, the Criminalist will be able to provide a report indicating that the number has been altered but not restored and may be able to provide a series of numbers for further investigation.
