

OHIO CRASHES

- There were 168 motorcycle-related fatalities in Ohio in 2010. This is 4% higher than the 161 killed in 2009. However, it is 21% fewer than during 2008 when the 25 year high of 213 fatalities was recorded.
- From 2008 to 2010 motorcycle-involved crashes resulted in a total of 542 fatalities and 11,484 injuries statewide.
- Of the 535 motorcycle-involved fatal crashes from 2008-2010, the motorcyclist was at-fault 68% of the time.
- Thirty-nine percent (39%) of motorcyclists involved in fatal crashes from 2008-2010 were alcohol- or drug-impaired.

OSHP CITATIONS

- OSHP troopers wrote 8,675 citations to motorcyclists from 2008-2010 (see map above). This is an increase of twenty-two percent (22%) over the previous three-year period from 2005-2007.
- Citations for driving a motorcycle without an appropriate operator license or endorsement increased by 26% between 2005-2007 and 2008-2010. These violations accounted for one in five (20%) motorcyclist citations.
- Forty-two percent (42%) of motorcyclist citations included speeding violations during 2008-2010. Compared to 2005-2007, speed citations increased 13%. Nine percent (9%) of motorcyclist citations included an OVI arrest.
- Citations have increased for all age groups, but especially older riders. Citations given to riders over 55 increased 46% from 2005-2007 to 2008-2010. For riders 46-55, the increase was 33%.

OHIO MOTORCYCLE REGISTRATIONS†

- The number of annual motorcycle registrations increased in every Ohio county from 2005-2007 to 2008-2010 (15% statewide). All but 2 counties had double-digit percentage increases in registrations. The biggest increases were in Morgan county (32%) and Knox county (30%) while the smallest increase was in Jefferson county (8%).
